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## **ARTIST STATEMENT**

Before college, I honestly had no idea I wanted to be in the art field. I previously had a bit of experience drawing throughout middle and high school, but it was all cognitive — nothing too serious. I did not think any more about art until I took a mandatory art history course in college. The artwork throughout the class was amazing to look at and the conversations in class were truly engaging, making your thoughts and ideas move freely and in new directions. It was at that point, piecing together my previous artistic skills and my new affinity for art history that I decided to give art a try...and it is easily the best decision I have ever made in my entire life.

I decided to focus on the graphic design spectrum of art for a couple of reasons. The first reason is because of the instability of the job market. While being an art degree holder within certain fields of art, job and career opportunities can be strained and limited. However, an art degree with graphic design emphasis and the right amount of effort and creativity, the job opportunities could double or triple depending on the situation and your ability to multitask and freelance.
